# *Cub Scouting*

## **Cub Scout Camping**

These are pack-organized overnight events involving more than one family from a single pack, focused on age-appropriate Cub Scout activities and conducted at council approved locations. If non-members (siblings) participate, the event must be structured accordingly to accommodate them. BSA health and safety and youth protection guidelines apply. In most cases each youth member will be under the supervision of a parent or guardian. In all cases, each youth participant is responsible to a specific adult.

Adults giving leadership to a pack overnighter must complete Basic Adult Leader Outdoor Orientation (BALOO) training to properly understand the importance of program intent, youth protection guidelines, health and safety, site selection, age-appropriate activities, and sufficient adult participation. Permits for campouts will be issued at the council office. Packs must use Tour and Activity Plans.

The BALOO trained leader must be in attendance for the entire campout. Overnighthers organized by the pack are supplemental to participation in council and district-organized camping opportunities. Some packs choose to organize one or two overnight opportunities during the year, once in the spring and once in the fall. Because every effort should be made to make these first campouts positive for the participants, wintertime camping activities or planning outings during potentially inclement weather are discouraged. Cub Scout Camping and Webelos tent camping outdoors at Baiting Hollow will not be approved for the period November 1 - March 31 of each year.

If a parent cannot attend, the boy's family must make arrangements for one of the other parents attending, or for another adult relative or friend, to be a substitute at the overnighter. Each boy should have someone he knows watching out for him. It is important that each Cub Scout be under the supervision of an adult and that every adult have a share of the responsibility for the overnighter. If necessary to accommodate a special circumstance, an adult may be responsible for more than one child. In no case shall one adult be responsible for more than three youth other than his or her own children. Youth protection guidelines are in effect regarding that the only adult that can sleep in a tent with a youth is the youth's parent or legal guardian.



# *Webelos Scouts*

## *Bridging to Boy Scouts*

### **Webelos Camping**

Webelos den overnight campouts provide opportunities for Webelos Scouts to enjoy the increasing camping challenges offered by BSA's progressive outdoor program, but still within the family environment of Cub Scouting. Webelos camping experiences should help prepare Webelos Scouts for the camping adventures of Boy Scouting without taking away from the type of camping they will experience as a member of a Boy Scout troop.

Webelos dens are encouraged to have several overnight campouts each year during the spring and fall months. Webelos dens shall not tent camp outdoors during the period November 1 - March 31 each year. The Webelos den overnight campouts are parent-son events, under the direction of the Webelos den leader. In most cases, each Webelos scout is under the supervision of his own father, mother, or guardian. If a parent or guardian cannot attend, the boy's family should make arrangements for one of the other parents or another adult relative or friend to be a substitute at the campout. It is essential that each Webelos Scout is under the supervision of an adult and that every adult has a share of the responsibility for the campout. Webelos dens are encouraged to participate in joint overnight campouts with a Boy Scout troop; however, a parent or guardian of each Webelos Scout must still attend. These campouts are especially encouraged during the fifth-grade year. These campouts, conducted with an individual troop for the purpose of strengthening ties between the pack and troop, are to be held separate from any district or council Boy Scout activities. The Webelos Den Leader should discuss these guidelines with the host troop for coordination.

No leader should be responsible for more than two Webelos scouts on a campout other than his or her own children. Youth protection guidelines that the only adult that can sleep in a tent with a scout is his parent or legal guardian are in effect. Webelos den campouts are not open to siblings.

Webelos scouts should be experiencing family-type camping, as opposed to the more challenging type of camping that they will be experiencing as Boy Scouts. A location that has a tested water supply, toilets, cooking facilities, space for pitching tents, and an indoor activity area would be appropriate for a Webelos den overnight campout.

If you use Baiting Hollow, be sure that the Webelos campsite is away from regular Boy Scout camping areas. The campsite should be located near a parking area because the family-type equipment that will be used probably will be heavy and difficult to carry any distance. In selecting the location for a Webelos overnight campout, remember that Webelos Scouts should not experience Boy Scout-type camping on the overnight. Webelos overnights do not include backpacking. Webelos overnight camping at Boy Scout camporees and/or events is not a BSA-approved activity.

When tents are used, no youth will stay in the tent of an adult other than his parent or legal guardian. When housing other than tents is used, separate housing must be provided for male and female participants. Permits for campouts are issued at the Council Service Center. Webelos dens use the Local Tour Permit Application.



# Boy Scouts

## April is Youth Protection Month

Our greatest responsibility is the safety of the youth in our care. We all know we have to review our training every two years but that doesn't mean it shouldn't be always on our mind. We have rules for our youth's safety but they can only prevent abuse if we know and follow them. There have been some updates to the policy's which can be found in full at :

### Scouting's Barriers to Abuse

"The BSA has adopted the following policies for the safety and well-being of its members. These policies primarily protect youth members; however, they also serve to protect adult leaders. Parents and youth using these safeguards outside the Scouting program further increase the safety of their youth. Scout leaders in positions of youth leadership and supervision outside the Scouting program will find these policies help protect youth in those situations as well."

**Two-deep leadership on all outings required.** A minimum of two registered adult leaders, or one registered leader and a participating Scout's parent, or another adult is required for all trips and outings. One of these adults must be 21 years of age or older.

**Two-deep leadership and no one-on-one contact between adults and youth members includes digital communication.** Leaders may not have one-on-one private online communications or engage one-on-one in other digital activities (games, social media, etc.) with youth members. Leaders should copy a parent and another leader in digital and online communication, ensuring no one-on-one contact exists in text, social media, or other forms of online or digital communication.

### Patrol Activities

There are instances, such as patrol activities, when the presence of adult leaders is not required and adult leadership may be limited to patrol leadership training and guidance. With proper training, guidance, and approval by troop leaders, the patrol can conduct day hikes and service projects.

### Adult Supervision/Coed Activities

Male and female adult leaders must be present for all overnight coed Scouting trips and outings, even those including parent and child. Both male and female adult leaders must be 21 years of age or older, and one must be a registered member of the BSA.

Age-appropriate and separate accommodations for adults and Scouts are required.

### **Tenting**

No adult may share a tent with the opposite sex unless he or she is that adult's spouse.

No youth may share a tent with an adult or a person of the opposite sex other than a family member or guardian. *Assigning youth members more than two years apart in age to sleep in the same tent should be avoided unless the youth are relatives.*

- The buddy system should be used at all times.
- Privacy of youth is respected.
- Inappropriate use of smart phones, cameras, imaging, or digital devices is prohibited.
- No secret organizations.
- Youth leadership is monitored by adult leaders.
- Discipline must be constructive.
- Appropriate attire is required for all activities.
- No hazing.
- No bullying.

**All adult leaders and youth members have responsibility.** Everyone is responsible for acting in accordance with the Scout Oath and Scout Law. Physical violence, sexual activity, emotional abuse, spiritual abuse, unauthorized weapons, hazing, discrimination, harassment, initiation rites, bullying, cyberbullying, theft, verbal insults, drugs, alcohol, and pornography have no place in the Scouting program and may result in revocation of membership.
