

Communication: Beyond the Email

Sometimes it seems to be the hardest part of the Scouting job. Communication. How do we let our Scouts and parents know what is going on and what is planned? Years ago the choices were fewer. Call or have a ditto at the meetings. Today, we have websites, social media, email, texts, newsletters, flyers and phone calls to choose from. And to add to the issue, many people prefer one method over another to receive their information. So how do we make this all work? The answer may be in doing some of a few things. A Pack website is very helpful to have all the information available to parents. But relying on parents to go to the website to find out about events will probably not yield good results. Busy parents with young children need the information served to them rather than hope that they seek it out. Websites should be a resource and repository of information regarding the group and their activities. Other avenues of communication like social media may help. Facebook groups can get the word out to parents when they are already on line. Even robo calling or texting is becoming accessible to Scouts. There are companies who market their robo texting services to Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts. Even simple things like handing out a calendar of events in the beginning of the year helps. Parents can put the events on their calendar and they are more likely to attend. Making an email identifiable as Pack communication is also helpful. Create a special email address for your unit. It also makes a clear distinction between things sent by you personally and things sent by your unit. Good communication takes a little experimentation. Give something new a try!

Bridging to Boy Scouts

Arrow of Light and Crossing Over: Together or Separate?

Should the Arrow of Light be awarded at the same time that the Scouts cross over to a Troop? Not necessarily. Many Packs have differing reasons for doing them together or at different times. Aside from the tradition (or we've always done it that way reasoning), there are things that deserve consideration on both sides. On the side of doing them together, it is a great way to send the Scouts off from the Pack. They receive their award and cross over to their new Troop. Family members can be present for both without having to attend two separate gatherings. And if done at a Blue and Gold or other Pack gathering, it gives the younger ranks something to strive for and look forward to. But others will say that it is just too much to do in one meeting and really give it the attention it deserves. It takes too long and the other kids lose interest. In Packs where Webelos go on to only one Troop, they may want to do the crossing over at a Troop campout. This way they jump right into the program. Other units feel that the Scouts

should be given the AOL when it is earned, not wait until they all have achieved it. Whatever way it is done in your unit be sure to give both ceremonies the attention they deserve.

Where Eagles Dare

Some advice from an eagle scout to younger scouts given at his last meeting before he aged out.

Hi everyone. As some of you may've noticed, I've been in this troop for a couple of years now and tonight is my last night with you all as a scout. So for tonight I thought I'd share what I've learned in these past 8 years by making my own scout law. If you follow this version of the scout law, then I think you've gotten everything out of not only Boy Scouts, but out of this troop too.

1. First off, a scout is **INDEPENDENT**. A scout doesn't need Mom and Dad to help him every step of the way. He can stand up on his own two feet and carry his own weight.
2. A scout is **DEPENDENT**. A scout can't try and carry the whole weight of the world on his shoulders, though. He needs to be able to depend on his friends, family, and fellow scouts to help him along the way.
3. A scout is **OPINIONATED**. He pays attention to the world around him and adds his two cents when needed. He should ask questions about what he knows, unless he's driving his poor SPL crazy.
4. A scout is **BAE**. Hopefully some of you got the reference, and if not, I'm really getting old. Either way, the lesson here is that a scout needs to make sure he's having fun being a scout because that's what we're supposed to be about: learning new things and having fun doing it.
5. A scout is **PROUD**. He takes pride in both his accomplishments and mistakes because...
6. A scout is **IMPERFECT**. He makes mistakes just like anyone else. But what separates him from others is his ability to take a lesson out of them.
7. A scout is **CREATIVE**. Now, this one doesn't mean just being able paint a picture, write a poem, or play a song. A scout's creativity comes into play when he faces a problem. He'll need to be creative to find a solution, whether it be facing it head on or by looking at it from a different angle.
8. Lastly, a scout is **UNIQUE**. He leaves an impression on those he meets and makes memories with others that will last him, and them, a lifetime.

Notice I didn't say anything about rank advancement or becoming Eagle. That was on purpose because becoming an Eagle Scout shouldn't be your primary goal as a scout. Sure, you learn a lot from going down that road, and I totally recommend it, but if you focus solely on advancing to Eagle then, I'm sorry, you've missed the point of being a Boy Scout. Being a Boy Scout is about the adventures you go on, the people you meet, and the lessons you learn. So don't keep

your faces glued to your books. Look around, enjoy yourself, and be happy you have this opportunity.


