Outing in Scouting

We have all worked very hard to ensure a smooth transition to the new program for our Scouts. Just a quick reminder that not everyone has caught up with the change. The new program offers great opportunity to get the Cubs out into the community. Please be sure to check with any place or group you plan to visit that they have the new guidelines and will use them in your presentation. Some larger places, like the Cradle of Aviation, are up to date and ready to go with all Cub requirements; others have not seen the new requirements and do not have their programs up to date. You can provide them with the new requirements that you would like addressed at your visit and most places will be happy to adjust their program.

Outings are often the things that Cubs remember the most. Parents often remark about how much fun an overnight or trip was, and how they would never have gone to a particular place without the Scouts. Not only is it fun for everyone to do the outings but it is easier for you. Less planning and the topic is left to someone who can do it efficiently and make it fun.

Bridging to Boy Scouts

Webelos Woods Tips

It's an event that the Webelos look forward to - being with the "big boys". This is a great time for them to see what being a Boy Scout is like, to get them excited about it and to have them visit Troops that they could join. There is a lot to do at WW, set up camp, cook meals, keep track of the boys and on and on. Here are a few tips that may help make your experience all that it can/should be.

1. Make sure your parents and Webelos know their pack number. Knowing the pack

number, and not the den number, becomes essential in directing arrivals to their campsite.

2. Remind parents that there are a lot of people arriving at the event at the same time and that parking is limited and cars cannot block the roadways. Make sure your campsite is clearly marked so that parents do not have a problem finding you.
3. There is an opening ceremony at 9:00 am on Saturday – wear complete uniforms and **bring Pack flags, banners, etc. If you have a Pack plaque, bring it to the Council Tent.**
4. This is a Class “A” event, all Scouts should wear complete uniform.
5. Please be prompt for everything – there is a schedule. The time with the Troops is essential and goes quickly.
6. On Saturday night there will be a dessert bake-off competition. Box oven cooking should be used with Webelos doing the baking using guidance from leaders and /or parents.
7. Boy Scout Troops will attend and help with the program. Plan on visiting Troops at this event. Know which Troops are in your area so you can have the boys/parents pay particular attention to them.
8. Absolutely NO alcohol permitted. A gentle reminder to parents ahead is always a good idea.
9. Do not leave fires unattended. Do not allow Scouts to put sticks in the fire and then remove them. Have water nearby in case the fire spreads.
10. Quiet time is from 11 pm to 6:30 am. Please be respectful of your neighboring camps and keep the noise down after quiet hours.
11. Make sure your Scouts (and parents) can identify poison ivy. There is plenty of it around.
12. Send families a list of what to bring. Remind them that it can get cold in late October. Remember, many families do not have a lot of camping experience.
13. Have fun! Take a moment to enjoy this time. The boys will be off to Boy Scouts soon and will be independent.

Webelos to Scout Transition – Troop Responsibilities

1. Select Scouts to serve as den chiefs for each Webelos Scout den and Cub Scout den. Arrange for Den Chief Training.
2. Serve as a resource for overnight activities. The troop can be of service to provide equipment, leadership, and logistics for Webelos parent-son campouts.
3. Conduct an orientation in the Bear Cub Scout dens to explain the changing role as boys

become Webelos Scouts and then again as they become Boy Scouts. Explain how being a Webelos Scout will help prepare them for Boy Scouting.

4. Webelos den/Scout troop campouts should show Webelos Scouts and their parents what to expect when they move into the troop. The troop should cook and camp by patrol, and use skills that the Webelos Scouts can participate in.
5. Arrange for Webelos dens to visit a troop meeting. This should be planned several weeks in advance.
6. Provide each Webelos Scout a copy of the troop's activities for the upcoming year.
7. Work with Webelos den leaders to encourage them to plan to move into the troop with their Webelos Scouts and to serve either as committee members or assistant Scoutmasters.
8. Conduct a Scoutmaster conference under the guidance of the Scoutmaster or the assistant designated by the Scoutmaster. This conference should cover the meaning of the Scout Oath and Law, the advancement program, troop camping, the patrol method, summer camp, and personal equipment.
9. Work with the Cubmaster in planning a meaningful crossover ceremony at the pack's blue and gold banquet. Coordinate the ceremony and arrange for each Webelos Scout to receive a troop neckerchief and Boy Scout Handbook along with his Arrow of Light Award. Members of the Order of the Arrow may assist in the ceremony.
