Ceremonies

When most leaders hear the word ceremony, they either smile or roll their eyes. Ceremonies are a great part of the Cub Scout Program. Too many leaders get put off by thinking that they have to be complicated, full of cool props, or said exactly as they were written.

Why do we do ceremonies? Because they -

- Are fun. The Scouts enjoy them and it makes them feel important.
- Promote consistency. This particular ceremony means that this event is happening.
- Are memorable. Ceremonies create memories.
- Help recognize achievements of the Scouts, Leaders and Volunteers.
- Help teach the ideals of Scouting.
- Help with timing of the meeting. It lets everyone know the meeting is starting or ending.

Good ceremonies don't require much. Your sincerity in leading it is key! Don't sweat the details. Don't be intimidated by resources that say you need extensive, expensive props. Don't feel like you have to stick to the printed script. The simple act of lighting a candle to mark an event is special. A special hat for a certain ceremony is enough. Speak from the heart, reading from a page is harder for people to follow. Have fun!

Closing ceremonies in particular will let the Pack or Den know that your meeting has ended. Otherwise, parents are waiting for a cue that the event is over. Often using the same closing, helps the Scouts identify as a group.

If you haven't used a lot of ceremonies in your unit, give it a try. You never know, you might come up with a terrific new tradition!

Bridging to Boy Scouts

Webelos Woods Tips

It's an event that the Webelos look forward to - being with the "big boys". This is a great time for them to see what being a Boy Scout is like, to get them excited about it and to have them visit Troops that they could join. There is a lot to do at WW, set up camp, cook meals, keep track of the boys and on and on. Here are a few tips that may help make your experience all that it can/should be.

- Make sure your parents and Webelos know their pack number. Knowing the pack number, and not the den number, becomes essential in directing arrivals to their campsite.

- Remind parents that there are a lot of people arriving at the event at the same time that parking is limited and cars cannot block the roadways. Make sure your campsite is clearly marked so that parents do not have a problem finding you.
- There is an opening ceremony at 9:00 am – wear complete uniforms and **bring Pack flags, banners, etc. If you have a Pack plaque bring it to the Council Tent.**
- This is a Class “A” event, all Scouts should wear complete uniform.
- Please be prompt for everything – there is a schedule. The time with the Troops is essential and goes quickly.
- On Saturday night there will be a dessert bake-off competition. Box oven cooking should be used with Webelos doing the baking using guidance from leaders and /or parents.
- Boy Scout Troops will attend and help with the program. Plan on visiting Troops at this event. Know which Troops are in your area so you can have the boys/parents pay particular attention to them.
- Absolutely NO alcohol permitted. A gentle reminder to parents ahead is always a good idea.
- Do not leave fires unattended. Do not allow Scouts to put sticks in the fire and then remove them. Have water nearby in case the fire spreads.
- Quiet time is from 11 pm to 6:30 am. Please be respectful of your neighboring camps and keep the noise down after quiet hours.
- Make sure your Scouts (and parents) can identify poison ivy. There is plenty of it around.
- Send families a list of what to bring. Remind them that it can get cold in late October. Remember, many families do not have a lot of camping experience.

Have fun! Take a moment to enjoy this time. The boys will be off to Boy Scouts soon and will be independent.

Troop Responsibilities for the Webelos to Scout Transition

- Select Scouts to serve as den chiefs for each Webelos Scout den and Cub Scout den. Arrange for Den Chief Training.
- Serve as a resource for overnight activities. The troop can be of service to provide equipment, leadership, and logistics for Webelos parent-son campouts.
- Conduct an orientation in the Bear Cub Scout dens to explain the changing role as boys become Webelos Scouts and then again as they become Boy Scouts. Explain how being a Webelos Scout will help prepare them for Boy Scouting.
- Webelos den/Scout troop campouts should show Webelos Scouts and their parents what to expect when they move into the troop. The troop should cook and camp by patrol, and use

skills that the Webelos Scouts can participate in.

- Arrange for Webelos dens to visit a troop meeting. This should be planned several weeks in advance.
- Provide each Webelos Scout a copy of the troop's activities for the upcoming year.
- Work with Webelos den leaders to encourage them to plan to move into the troop with their Webelos Scouts and to serve either as committee members or assistant Scoutmasters.
- Conduct a Scoutmaster conference under the guidance of the Scoutmaster or the assistant designated by the Scoutmaster. This conference should cover the meaning of the Scout Oath and Law, the advancement program, troop camping, the patrol method, summer camp, and personal equipment.
- Work with the Cubmaster in planning a meaningful crossover ceremony at the pack's blue and gold banquet. Coordinate the ceremony and arrange for each Webelos Scout to receive a troop neckerchief and Boy Scout Handbook along with his Arrow of Light Award. Members of the Order of the Arrow may assist in the ceremony.

Boy Scout troops should assign an assistant Scoutmaster or a troop committee member to be responsible for new Scouts, which would include developing a relationship with the Cubmaster and the Webelos den leaders. This person serves as a resource during Webelos overnight activities and builds enthusiasm among boys and their parents for the exciting challenges that await them in Boy Scouting.
