It's Recruitment Time!!

It's a new school year, so it's time for some new Scouts! Fall is the perfect time to add to your Pack. And there is a great recruiting incentive going on - get 10 boys, get Pinewood Derby Cars free. More Cubs, free stuff, how awesome is that?

So how do you recruit for new Scouts?

- Find any Facebook pages that families in your district go to for information and post that you are looking for new Cubs.
- Have someone attend your school's first PTA meeting and make an announcement at the meeting. Ask if the PTA would include your recruitment message in one of their emails.
- Speak to the building Principal about having a recruiting table at Meet the Teacher night. Bring some pictures or a slideshow on a laptop to get people's interest. Have applications and information ready to show parents.
- Have a Pack Pride day and ask your Cubs to wear their Class B's to school.
- Make sure that your PIN is correctly "populated" or filled out. Otherwise it defaults to the Service Center (Council Office) and they have to forward on to you. Don't know how to populate your PIN? Ask your UC.
- Have a "bring a friend night" at a Pack meeting.
- If your school district isn't doing the "green thing" have the Service Center make a flyer for you and have it sent home in the backpacks from school.
- If you charter with a church or synagogue, see if you can have an announcement put in their bulletin.
- Ask friends if their sons would like to join!

The best recruiting tool is yourself, your Cubs and your enthusiasm! Be creative and have fun.

Definition of ROUND TABLE (www.merriam-webster.com)

From the "Guide to Safe Scouting"

Caving - General Policy

Caving can be a hazardous activity when the proper equipment, skills, and judgment are not used. Trips that are led by adults inexperienced in caving and trips containing large numbers of persons compound the hazards already inherent in the activity and create a potentially dangerous situation.

A. All caving, other than simple novice activities, should be limited to adults and young **people 14 and older**—members of Venturing crews or Learning for Life Explorer posts, and older Scouts in troops and teams. "Simple novice activities" means commercially operated cave excursions.

Climbing and Rappelling

The requirements applicable to climbing and rappelling listed in National Camp Standards, No. 430-056, apply to district and council activities.

- Climbing activities in which the participant's feet are more than 6 feet off the ground must be top-rope belayed.
- All rappelling activities must be properly belayed (see NCAP standard PS-206).
- Climb On Safely (see www.scouting.org/outdoorprogram/COPE) applies to climbing activities operated by a unit.
- BSA units conducting their own climbing activities must follow the requirements set forth in

Climb On Safely.

- Leaders who supervise unit climbing activities must have current Climb On Safely training (available at MyScouting.org).

Boy Scouts can:

- Belay with supervision and a backup.
- Climb on natural rock.
- In addition, older Boy Scouts (age 13 and older), Varsity Scouts, and Venturers may participate in lead climbing, snow and ice climbing, canyoneering, and caving subject to the following:

All participants must be at least 13 years old.

- Qualified instructors must have training from a nationally recognized organization that trains climbing instructors in the appropriate special activity. Note: BSA National Camping School does not train climbing directors and instructors in lead climbing, snow and ice climbing, canyoneering, or caving.
- Lead climbing without a top-rope belay is prohibited as part of a council or district activity.
- Units may conduct activities involving lead climbing with adult supervision and qualified instructors.
