Getting Ready for Next Year

With the June Roundtable, we are talking Program Launch. Each unit now begins the planning for the coming Scout Year. You'll have your Suffolk County Council Calendars and your program packets. Almost all of you have been through this process so touching on how to plan may not be needed. Discussing the basis for your annual planning is better for ensuring your boys receive the total experience of a Cub Scout and Webelos program. It's not only making a calendar for the year.

First, what are your goals in planning? The same as the Aims of Scouting: Growth in moral strength and character, participating citizenship, Development in physical, mental, and emotional fitness. What are your boys' goal? It's one thing - to have fun. Put the two together in your planning. How can you do that? Utilize the Cub Scout Journey to Excellence.

The idea is to provide your boys with as many experiences and guidance as possible so that the Aims of Scouting are achieved without them even knowing it. (At least not until they realize it as adults.) All these experiences are going to happen in different locations: in the family, in the den, in the pack and at district and council events. Addressing all the categories in the Pack Journey to Excellence as a planning tool (available at www.scouting.org) ensures you touch all the bases. Why reinvent the wheel?

With the Journey to Excellence criteria as your planning guide, you can do it all:

- Advancement – Plan to keep them on track. The boys see their growth through recognition
- Retention – What do you need to do to make sure the boys want to come? Fun and safety.
- Building Cub Scouting – By marketing your pack, communicating, and recruiting you ensure other boy will have fun and grow.
- Trained Leadership – Fully trained leadership ensures everyone is on the same page. A common understanding makes for a common goal and achievement.
- Outdoor Activities – The outdoors in a learning lab for personal responsibility and growth. There's a fascinating natural world out there your boys will be entrusted with for future generations.
- Day/Resident/Family Camp – Outdoor activities provided by the council. The introduction to the outdoors in a structured environment.
- Service Projects – Give back to your chartering org and to the community. Can you say Scouting for Food?
- Leadership Planning – You need to address grooming the next generation of adult leaders.
- Webelos-to-Scout Transition – For this one, see the Webelos page of this issue.
- Budget – There will always be expenses. How much will your events cost and how will they be funded given your families situation? It doesn't always have to expensive to be good. And it shouldn't always be on the cheap.
- Pack and Den Meetings – Your Journey criteria says how many meeting you should have. National Boy Scouts provides a coordinated program to give your meetings snap, crackle and pop.
- Fitness – Don't forget fitness
- Register on Time – Units sometimes don't understand the additional work and their liability exposure from late registration and late re-chartering. On time means your boys and your unit is protected.

Bottom line: Know how you are going to plan. But concentrate on what your are planning for.

Bridging to Boy Scouts

Webelos to Scout Transition

The use of Journey to Excellence as a planning basis has a requirement for Webelos to Scout Transition, that there is a plan in place and a percentage of the second year Webelos register with a troop. There aren't all that many steps in next year's plan to facilitate achieving your goal.

Let's review some of the plan elements:

- Webelos Den Leader – The most influential person. Plan that the Webelos function as a patrol and the boys attend summer camp. Plan to provide the presence of the necessary Scout skills. Connect and get to know the Scoutmasters, attend a Troop meeting and recruit a Den Chief. Plan the graduation/bridging ceremony and promote Troop summer activities
- Scoutmaster – Get a scoutmaster involved. They will be the ones to benefit from a successful plan. Have Webelos and their parents attend Troop meetings and meet the scoutmaster. The scoutmaster can discuss program differences with Webelos' parents, troop activities, and the costs of camp and troop activity costs with Webelos' parents. Get the scoutmaster to assist in finding a den chief and be involved with the pack graduation ceremony and hold a pre-summer camp orientation for Scout skills
- Webelos Den Chief – A boy leading boys. They are often hard to locate but they are a tremendous resource for scout skills. They help operate the patrol and provide scout spirit. The position also fulfills a leadership advancement requirement for the den chief.
- Unit Commissioner - Plan a conversation with your unit commissioner who can help determine which troops are in the area, contact information and the programs they run.
- Parents - Parents are a source of encouragement and support. Make sure they understand the program. Plan a meeting with the Webelos parent to explain the transition your boys are going through. Discuss how and why it is different and what the goal of the Webelos program is.
- Training – Plan to attend all the Webelos leader training sessions. Get to know what to do and how it all fits together.
- Roundtable – Attending Roundtable keeps you current and provides ideas, helps you with problems and misunderstandings as well you can help others with what you know. It's a sharing experience that builds on the foundation of "fully trained".

What's the Plan, Stan?

If you run a Boy Scout Troop, even if your name isn't "Stan", you better have a plan. The old adage "Failing to Plan is Planning to Fail" most certainly applies for all Scouting activities – both on a macro and micro level.

Starting a year of Scouting, hoping to have fun and a great program, with lots of Advancement opportunities without a solid plan will almost always end in disappointment. How the plan gets made is as important as the plan itself. In Boy Scouts, we strive for a well-rounded program with service, camping, hiking, fund-raising, Courts of Honor and District and Council events. But we also want to maintain a Boy-led Troop. That is as important in the planning stage as in any other aspect of unit life. Adults should come to a Planning Session with support materials, planning pack (distributed at Roundtable), calendars (both school and local Council), a supply of paper, pens and markers and make sure you arrange for some snacks! Your Patrol Leaders Council (PLC) should run the meeting under the guidance of the SPL and Scoutmaster. Patrol Leaders should come with activities and places to go suggested by Patrol members before the meeting.

The best time to have your meeting(s) is during the summer, before the coming year. This gives time for plans to be made for more involved trips and you can hit the ground running in September. Don't forget to run the "plan" by the Troop Committee and get their input before going public. Lastly, make the final calendar of events and activities available to all Troop families so they too can adjust busy calendars.

Remember – Safety is always Job 1.
